Those that know me know how proud I am of Westside Family Health Center. Where do I even begin? I am proud of the quality healthcare we provide. I am proud of our state of the art building. I am proud of our amazing team who has worked so hard during such an extraordinarily challenging time, especially these last 18 months. And I am proud of my 22 years as President/CEO of WFHC!

I have some wonderful and inspiring news that I am VERY proud to share: 100% of our team is vaccinated. 100%!

That is a remarkable accomplishment for a community healthcare organization. With this accomplishment, we can serve as important role models to our patients as well as keep each other safe. In January and February, we vaccinated our team members and their families because so many live in close quarters with each other.

"Our team was so grateful!" Rosslyn Jones, a WFHC team member, told us, "I was fortunate to have my Mom and Brother receive the Covid 19 vaccine early on. I am also grateful by me being fully



vaccinated, I was afforded the opportunity to visit my brother in the ICU, not knowing that these would be my last visits with him." WFHC team members were 95% vaccinated in February and by this month, we became 100% vaccinated. We are currently providing boosters to team members and their families.

I am also very proud that we have vaccinated so many of our patients because we answered their questions, provided culturally competent information and served as trusted vaccine influencers. One patient, after her 2nd dose, told us with tears coming down her cheeks, "Thank you so much, I can finally see my family and hug my kids. It's been six months and you gave us back our family."

Meet WFHC's Community Outreach and Education Manager, Jessica Torres



Jessica, tell us a little about yourself.

I was born in Tijuana, Mexico where I lived until the age of 15. Living in Mexico, I personally experienced the challenges of a broken healthcare system in an impoverished country. In order for me and my family to see a doctor, we needed to wake up at 3 a.m., so we did not go very often. There was also a stigma regarding mental health care.

What changed for you when you came to the United States?

When I migrated to the US, I thought that all this would be over. I assumed that the American Dream came with quality health care. And it does, but not for so many people like myself. I saw how anxiety around immigration status of family members caused hesitancy to access healthcare.

Also, much to my surprise, I also personally experienced the stigma around mental health. Due to these obstacles, it was not until I attended UCLA for college that I first received health care services including mental health care. I was diagnosed with PTSD and Major Depressive Disorder. For the first time, I had a name to what was going on in my head and received treatment and relief.

How did you find out about WFHC?

When I decided to pursue a career in medicine, I started looking for places committed to helping people in need. I found Westside Family Health Center as a volunteer during college. This commitment intensified as I was able to reach out to people of color in need. I saw how relieved Spanish-speaking patients were as they heard me speaking their native language. After I graduated, I returned to work at WFHC and recently was promoted to Community Outreach and Education Manager.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

The most satisfying part of my job currently is speaking to patients to help them find the resources and referrals they need, including mental health services. Additionally, I am actively closing the healthcare gap by providing Covered California application assistance to my patients. It is so fulfilling to get to know my patients and their families and to help them improve their lives. I am also very excited to share that in November I will be going to Mississippi for one week with FEMA to give vaccines.

INTERVIEW WITH JAMES D. GARRITY, MANAGING DIRECTOR PRIVATE WEALTH ADVISOR, MORGAN STANLEY WEALTH MANAGEMENT

How did you first learn about Westside Family Health Center?

I first heard about WFHC through a close friend who has a sister on the staff. Even though I have been in Washington, D.C., for some time, many years ago I lived in Venice, so I had some familiarity with the Westside community. As I visited WFHC and learned about their work, I quickly became inspired to get involved and wanted to offer help.

What motivated you to support WFHC?

WFHC serves the children, adults, and elders among us who often have less access to public services than others more fortunate, and I feel a profound moral obligation to see their challenges and not be blind to their needs.

Learning about WFHC and meeting the incredible staff, I know that they share a dedication to improving the lives of others and an entire community. In supporting WFHC, I am trying to make a small difference, to perhaps help just one person, who in turn will make a difference in the future journey of a single family. In the end analysis, isn't that a measure of a worthwhile contribution?



Why did you decide to name a Family Practice exam room in WFHC's new flagship site?

Public service and offering access to quality healthcare is part of my family's legacy. My father practiced family medicine in a small rural New England town for more than forty years, caring for all generations of patients from every walk of life. My mother was the office manager and nurse. Prior to his own family practice, Dad served in the US Public Health Service, offering medical care to Native Americans at a small reservation outside Lawton, Oklahoma. I decided to offer substantial support to WFHC to honor the memories of my parents' work, and to celebrate their legacy of service to others. My parents afforded me opportunities and support that allowed me to enjoy some career success. I feel that I am now at a point in my life where I must recycle this support into great organizations like WFHC to help others in need. I donated stock instead of cash as I was able to give more to the Center to help fund their programs.

Access to quality care has literally saved the lives of my children, as we spent months facing severe health challenges in their infancy that are fortunately now just intense memories. Thoughts of those nervous days and long scary nights can still bring me to silence and the brink of tears.

I think that WFHC is the perfect organization for my involvement – it's small enough that my contributions have a real impact that I can see and feel, but large enough to make a lasting difference across an entire community. I'm proud to be part of the WFHC team.

Alana Kamins, a 16-year-old high school student at Brentwood School, is the founder of Sprinkle of Hope, a project that helps those in need by giving them everyday life necessities in jars. Alana chose Westside Family Health Center as the perfect place to distribute the jars because, "with Sprinkle of Hope, I am helping clients at Westside Family Health Center, 96% of whom live at or below the poverty line. I am providing them with these daily necessities to help ensure daily health to those in need of the most support."

Since 2018, Alana has raised the funds, purchased and packed products, and has delivered over 300 Hope Jars and backpacks worth \$15,000 to Westside Family Health Center filled with important and costly necessities such as tampons, shaving cream, Aquaphor, deodorant, etc. The necessities have adapted to the needs of WFHC's patients, which have included fuzzy socks for the Winter Jars, school supplies for pediatric patients, and most recently, masks, gloves and hand sanitizer for the Pandemic Prevention Jars.

Alana has received grants for her project from funders including Visionary Women and the Jewish Federation. Congratulations for this well-deserved honor, Alana. Your Sprinkle of Hope Jars have uplifted many of Westside Family Health Center's team members and patients. Sprinkle of Hope is needed now more than ever.


